8:30 – 9:30 a.m. Beyond the Census: Preparing for Tennessee's New Population Certification Law (1 hour) Speakers: Tim Kuhn, Director, Tennessee State Data Center Cassie Stinson, ECD Director of Research

A new state law will require annual updates to municipal population figures, replacing the current reliance on the decennial census and optional special censuses. Beginning January 1, 2026, the University of Tennessee's Boyd Center will provide yearly population estimates to be certified and used to determine per capita tax allocations and eligibility for population-based state grants and programs. This workshop will explain how the new process works, what it means for growing and shrinking communities, and how local governments can prepare for the changes taking effect in the 2026-2027 fiscal year.
